
PLAYING WITH WORDS

A simile is a comparison using the words "like" or "as." For example, "She was so surprised, her eyes were as big as balloons!"

A metaphor is a comparison that does not use the words "like" or "as." For example, "My teacher just gave me a tidal wave of homework!" Write two metaphors below.
